Melissa is Safe Zone trained and supports LGBTQIA+ individuals who have experienced sexual violence. She is available to walk with students through both the campus disciplinary process and the city's criminal process. Obtaining peace and protective orders, getting a S.A.F.E. (sexual assault forensic exam) exam at Mercy hospital and navigating the criminal system are a few of the many resources she can provide.

The Counseling Center has experienced professionals who promote an awareness and sensitivity towards differences in race, gender, identity, and expression. TurnAround provides wrap-around and therapeutic services for survivors of intimatepartner violence, sexual violence, and human trafficking. These services include case management, group and individual therapy, legal advocacy, emergency shelter, referrals, and employment readiness. They also have crisis response services, including a 24/7 helpline and text line to meet a survivors immediate safety needs.

Mercy Medical Center is a designated treatment center for sexual assault and domestic violence in Baltimore City. It has 30 specially trained Forensic Nurse Examiners (FNEs) available 24/7 to care for victims of sexual assault, and victims of domestic violence of all LGBTQ+ identities (including men, women, non-binary, and transgender individuals). The Forensic Nurse Examiner Program practices inclusive care and works collaboratively with criminal justice agencies and other Baltimore agencies addressing the needs of victims of violence regardless of how they identify.
